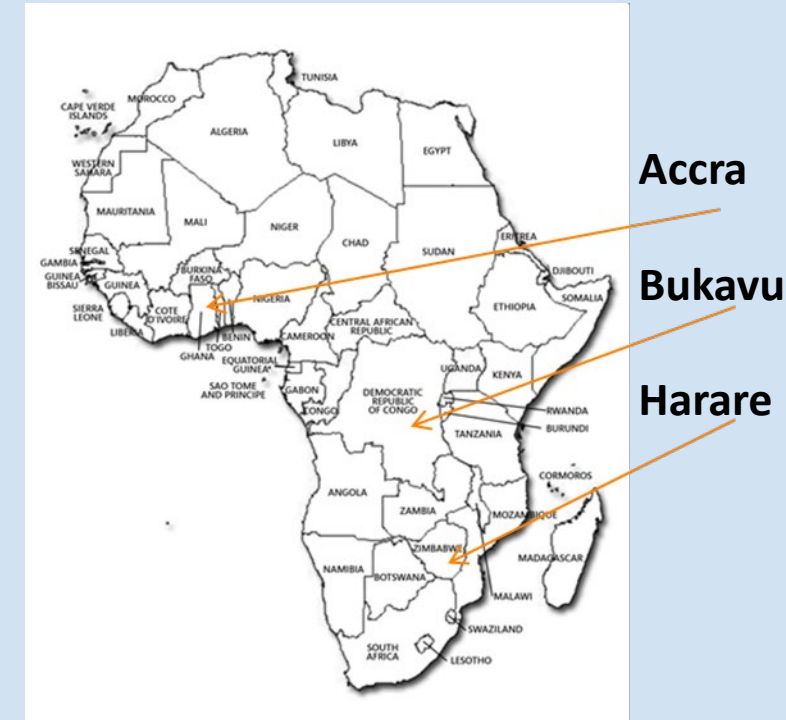

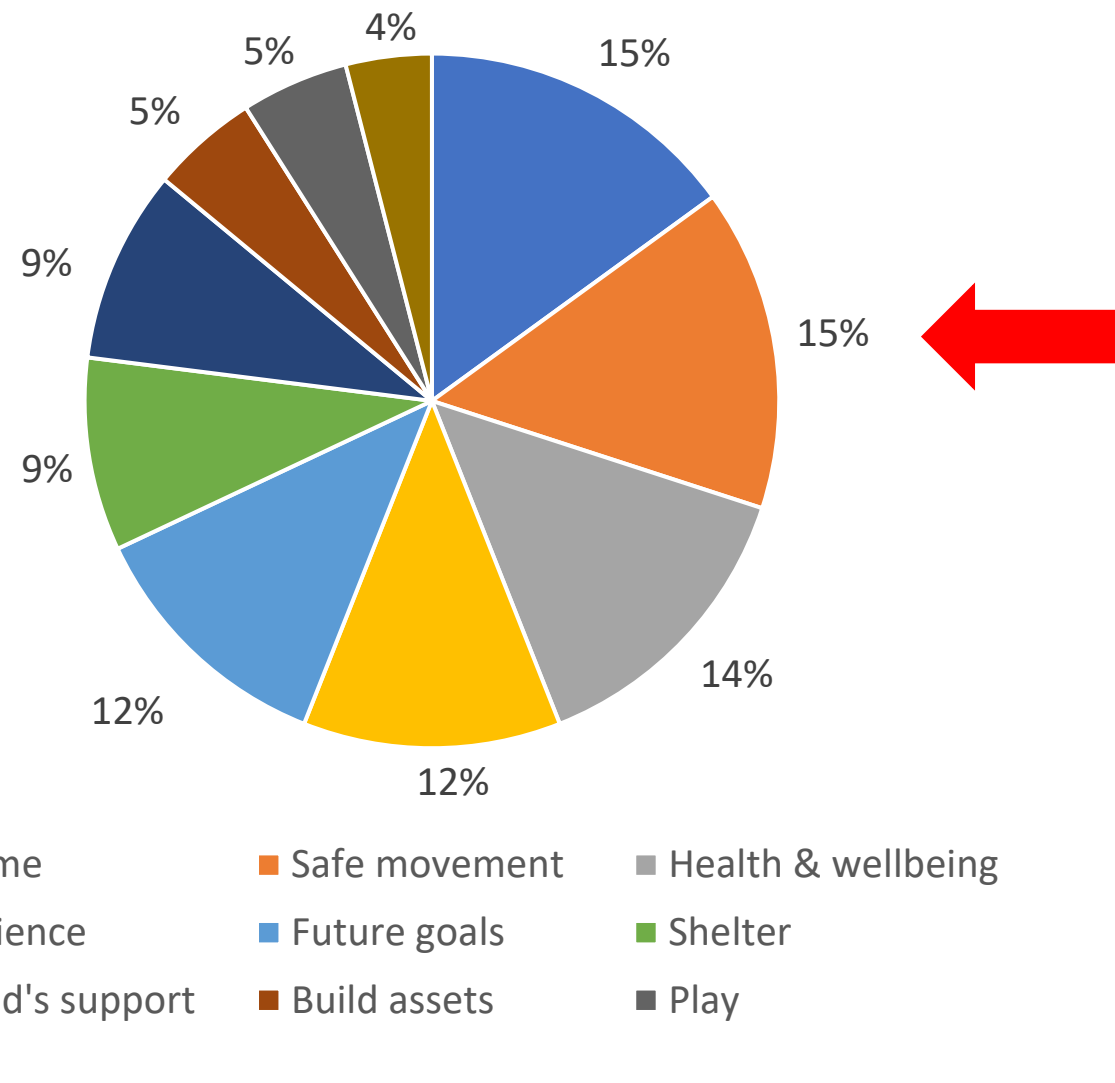


Capability codes

Ten capability codes mapped across total dataset.

Top three codes:

1. Safe movement (15%)
2. Income (15%)
3. Health and wellbeing (14%)

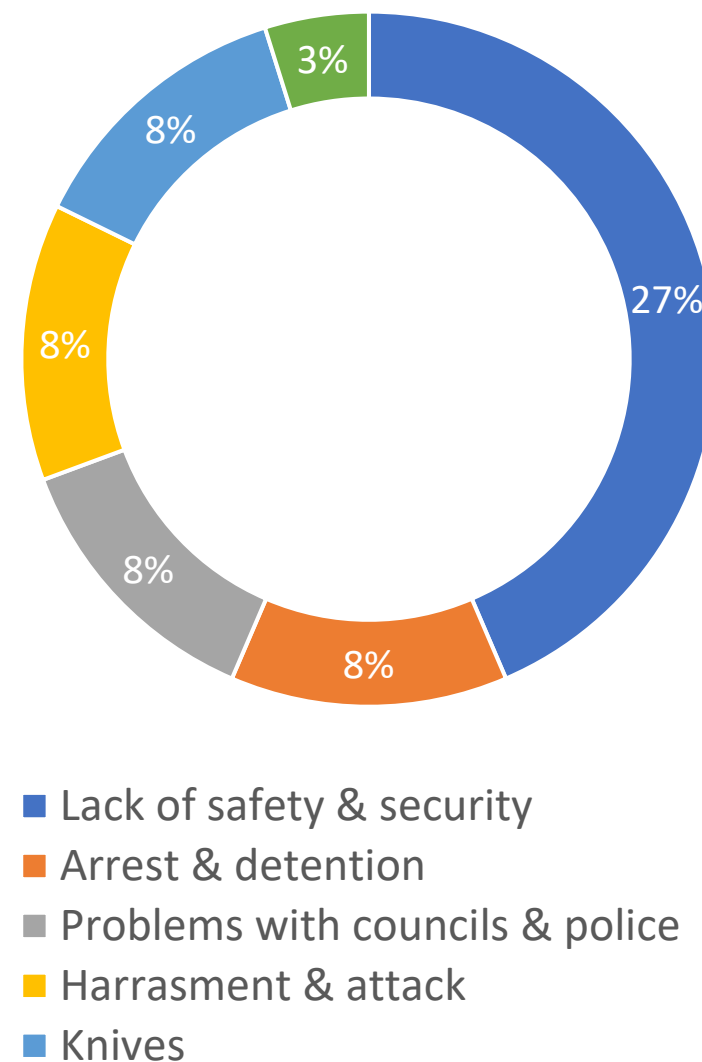
Safe movement

15 subcodes mapped across safe movement code (n= 11,326).

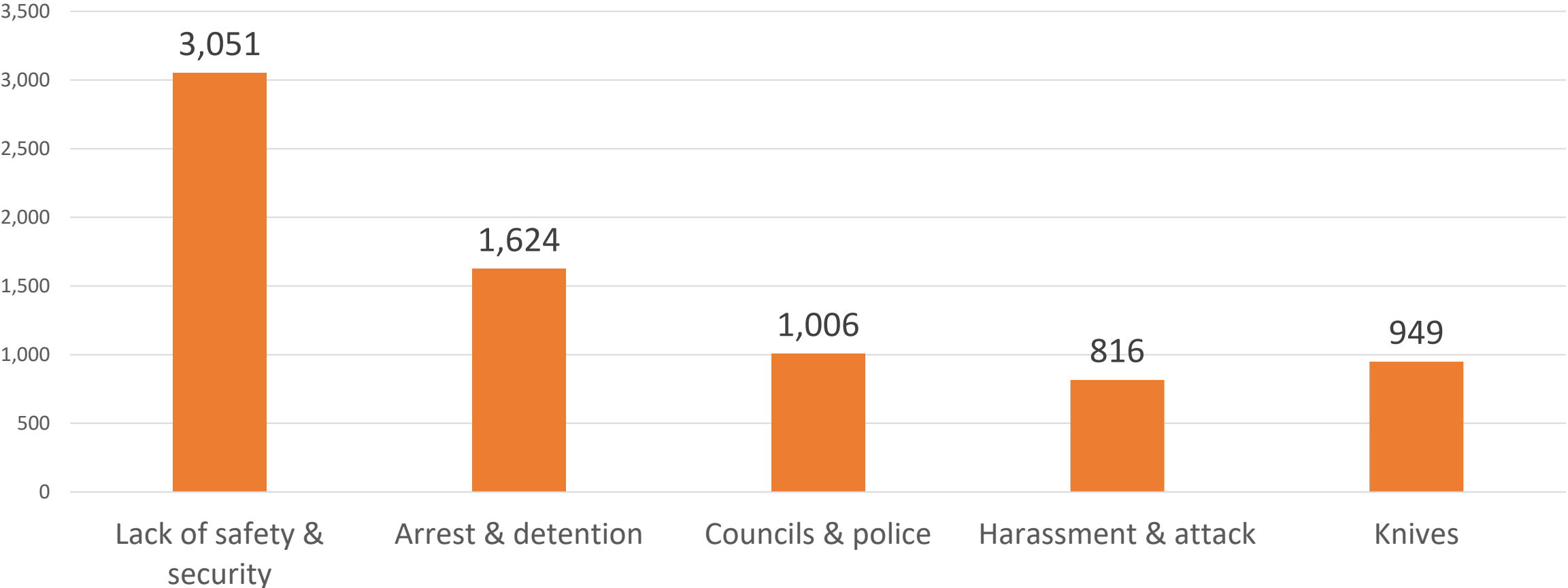
Top five sub-codes:

1. Lack of safety & security (27%)
2. Arrest & detention (13%)
3. Problems with councils & police (8%)
4. Harassment & attack (8%)
5. Knives (8%)

Positive & collaborative experiences with authorities (3%)



Number of violent incidences coded (for 379 young people)



“Yesterday for instance I was arrested but one policewoman rescued me- she investigated the matter and realized that I wasn’t guilty. So, the way you will talk and conduct yourself will let you get help from others”.

“There is a certain policeman who allowed us to play soccer at the {place}. He is like our Godfather because there was a time he would come here and sleep in his car protecting us”.



Recommendations for promising practices



Evidence for policymaking. Prof. Lorraine van Blerk & Anne Louise Meincke. 31/10/24

1. **Evidence matters:** policies and practices must be informed by evidence produced with street children and youth.
2. **Adapt child protection systems:** go beyond violence in family, school and online settings to consider realities of children and youth in street situations.
3. **Safety in the community:** Enable non-violent relationships with authorities and communities.
